There are many scholarships, bursaries and grants available to students graduating and continuing on with their post-secondary education. They are an excellent way to help finance your education because you do not have to pay them back!

MAIN SOURCES OF FINANCIAL AID FOR STUDENTS:

- 1. Scholarships:** Awarded on the basis of a select criteria which may include academic, leadership, service, etc. May or may not require writing examinations
- 2. Bursaries:** Awarded on the basis of student need, performance, or other requirement
- 3. Loans:** Granted for need



ELIGIBILITY:

Each scholarship, bursary or loan has its own requirements. Check each clause to ensure you are eligible to apply.

SCHOLARSHIPS

There are four basic types of scholarships and bursaries available to students, graduating and continuing on to post-secondary education.

- 1. Provincial Government** provides funds for students who excel in scholarship exams, academic and district awards for students who have demonstrated expertise in other areas such as Fine Arts, Applied Skills and Physical Activity (**Pages 5-7**)
- 2. Local businesses, unions and other organizations in Langley** donate scholarship money for Langley students to apply for (**Page 8**)
- 3. Post-secondary institutions** award entrance, academic and affiliation scholarships.
- 4. Scholarship aid from unions, business organizations and philanthropic groups outside Langley.** Students must apply for these scholarships on their own.

SCHOLARSHIPS: GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Scholarship information that periodically comes to the Counselling Centre will be recorded and filed for students to view. This information will also be emailed to all grade 12 students so please ensure that Mrs. Hopton has you on her email list.
2. If you are planning on attending a post-secondary institute, be sure to contact their financial aid office for assistance. They can provide excellent, up to date information to help you get the money you need. Pay special attention to the deadline dates for applications. Many of these awards must be applied for early.

4. Every award has a criteria list applicants must meet in order to apply. Be sure to read this thoroughly to assess your eligibility.
5. Most scholarship awards require applicants to be a Canadian citizen or a landed immigrant and have a social insurance number (SIN).
Keep your grades up. **Provincial Academic and Specialty Scholarships** in the amount of \$1000 are given to Grade 12 students meeting certain criteria: scholarship exams, specialties other than academic, GPA, etc.
6. Approximately 50 local and school scholarships are up for grabs. Application due date is **March 30**. Application forms will be available in January and can be picked up in the Counselling Centre.
To be eligible to apply you must complete a minimum of 12 Grade 11 and 12 four credit courses. Your TOP 12 will be used to calculate your grade point average (GPA).
7. Letters of reference may be required when applying for scholarships. Please ensure that you give enough notice and information to the person who will be writing your reference letter. A student profile should accompany your request. This will help the writer create a thorough and accurate profile for you to submit.
A sample of a student profile can be viewed on page 11.
8. **ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS** are awarded by the universities, colleges or trades and technology institutions. You must FIRST apply for admission before you apply for their entrance scholarships. **Some Entrance Scholarships are based on marks only.** ALL Grade 11 and 12 marks are considered.

Many scholarships consider the applicant's contribution to school and community life or the demonstration of leadership. Consider volunteer work or school involvement. Entrance scholarships are determined before you write provincial finals. Universities and Colleges determine your eligibility as based on your first and second term marks.

Provincial Government



British Columbia

The Provincial Government provides funds for students who excel in provincial exams and for those students who demonstrate expertise in the specialized area within Fine Arts, Applied Skills, Music and Physical Activity. The Ministry of Education distributes awards directly to students based on achievement level on the provincial examinations, and the School District gives awards to students in the Fine and Practical Arts. In addition, the Passport to Education and a Secondary School Apprenticeship scholarship are other awards given to students by the provincial government.

1. PROVINCIAL EXAM SCHOLARSHIP

Basic Eligibility Requirements

To be eligible for a Graduation Program Examinations Scholarship, a student:

- must be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident (landed immigrant) at the time of writing the provincial exams
- must be a BC resident
- must be registered as a home schooled or must be enrolled in a BC public school, private school or continuing education centre

Qualifying for a Graduation Program Examinations Scholarship

A student will receive a \$1000 Examinations Scholarship if he or she:

- meets the basic eligibility requirements
- fulfills the BC graduation requirements of the 2004 Grad Program
- meets the following requirements:
 - a. Achieves at least a "B" (73% or above) final mark (provincial exam and school mark combined) in one of the Language Arts 12 (Communications 12, English 12)
 - b. Achieves at least one "A" (86% or higher) and three "B"s (73% or higher) on four of his or her best provincial exams (can include the English 12 provincial exam).
 - c. The exams within each category below are restricted against each other for scholarship purposes; only the highest percent within each group is used to calculate a student's total.
 - d. Students must have a final course mark (course and exam combined) for the exam to be counted towards scholarship.

Additional Scholarship Recognition

A student will receive a \$2500 Examinations Scholarship if he or she:

- qualifies for the graduation program examinations scholarship
- ranks among the top twenty scholarship students (based on their percentage score)

Any student who achieves a perfect score (100%) in each of three provincial exams from grades 10 – 12 (exam mark) will also be awarded an Academic Medal of Excellence.

A student can receive a both a Graduation Program Examinations Scholarship and a Dogwood District/Authority Award in the same year.

2. DISTRICT DOGWOOD SCHOLARSHIP

- The number of district scholarships allocated to each high school is based on grade 12 enrollment. As of this year, each school will decide which student(s) will be awarded this scholarship.
- To be eligible, student must be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident (landed immigrant) at the time of applying for the scholarship and fulfill graduation requirements.
- All district specialty program scholarships require a **minimum of 4 courses in Grades 11 and 12 ALL in the specialty subject area.**
- The amount is \$500 for students who have demonstrated expertise in applied skills, fine arts or physical activity.
- An additional \$500 is available to the award winner who attends a post-secondary institution within five years.
- Standing is determined on the grade point average of the best 12 marks obtained in Grades 11 and 12 including English/Communications 11, English/Communications 12, Social Studies 11, a Mathematics 11 and a Science 11.
- Applicants are expected to make a presentation to the scholarship committee to demonstrate their expertise in their specialty area.
- Awards are made to the top students in the District at the graduation ceremony.

***Note: Students may win both a Provincial and a District Scholarship. Students have five years in which to redeem the Provincial and District Scholarship.**

3. PASSPORT TO EDUCATION

The Passport to Education award was created by the Ministry of Education in 1988 in order to:

- recognize and reward student achievement in grades 10 to 12
- motivate students to study consistently during the years leading to graduation
- encourage secondary school students to pursue further education through post-secondary institutions and job-training programs.

Each school is awarded Passport stamps based on student population. The award takes the form of stamps for each of grades 10–12 with a dollar value that can be applied directly to post-secondary tuition fees. When a student earns a stamp, the school puts the stamp into a passport booklet that is given to the student upon graduation or when the student leaves the school.

Grade 10 - \$250.00 stamp is based on the best 5 Ministry approved courses

Grade 11 - \$250.00 stamp is based on the best 5 Ministry approved courses

**Grade 12 - \$500.00 is based on final marks in best 5 Ministry approved courses
(current status of Portfolio 2011 graduates)**

4. Secondary School Apprenticeship (SSA) Scholarships

To qualify for the \$1000 Secondary School Apprenticeship Scholarship, a student must:

- be a registered youth apprentice with the Industry Training Authority*
- be enrolled in a British Columbia public school
- complete Ministry of Education graduation requirements for either the Grade 12 Graduation Programs
- maintain a C+ average in Grade 12 numbered courses
- successfully complete 16 credits of Ministry Developed SSA courses, which are based on 480 hours of paid workplace training, **no later than three months after graduation**
- submit an application form within one year of graduation from secondary school
- continue working or training full-time in the trade at least five months after secondary school graduation, or complete at least 1,100 apprentice able hours (including the 480 SSA hours) that are reported to the ITA.

*A student participating in the SSA program is required to be registered with the school district (i.e., in an SSA course) and the ITA (i.e., have a trade worker number) **prior to graduation**.

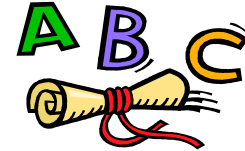

LOCAL AND LFMSS SCHOLARSHIPS

The Langley Scholarship Committee administers and collects funds from various individuals, firms, teachers and service clubs to be given to Grade 12 students proceeding to post-secondary training. LFMSS students compete with other Langley District students for approximately 50 awards. In addition, there will be 16 awards given only to LFMSS students. Students will only need to fill out **ONE** application form to apply for these scholarships.

This application package will be available for students to pick up in January 2010 in the Counselling Centre.



General qualifications for the Local and LFMSS Awards:

1. You need to hand in an application form by **March 30, 2012**
2. Overall average of at least 67% based on the **best twelve grade 11 and 12 four-credit courses**
GPA will be based on your marks up to Term 1 for Semester 2 classes.
3. Must have a Social Insurance Number
4. A student profile must be submitted with the application package
5. Must graduate with a BC dogwood graduation certificate by June 2012
6. Must attend a post-secondary institution within 5 years

Your application will be reviewed to determine which scholarships you are eligible for based on the criteria outlined with each award.

All local scholarships will be decided in April and the winners will receive recognition of their scholarship from their generous donor representative on the evening of their graduation ceremony.

The scholarship cheque will not be processed until the following is given to Mrs. Hopton by September 30, 2012:

- a copy of the 'thank you' letter sent to the donor
- a copy of a confirmation letter verifying post secondary enrolment at an institution

***PLEASE NOTE**

The donors list and scholarships are accurate at the time of printing, but may change without notice. This is a comprehensive list of **all** scholarships offered in this school district for information purposes only. You do not need to apply for specific scholarships; the questions answered on the general application form allow will provide information for the scholarship committee to determine your eligibility for the award. The usual percentage cut-off for the open scholarships is 67%. This is based on the 12 best 4 credit courses numbered 11 and 12.

Each college and university administers a large amount of scholarship money available for prospective students. The applications for these awards may be obtained directly online at the college and university website. The deadline for completion of these applications vary amongst the institutions so students should check the financial aid and scholarship sections of the calendars of post-secondary institutions they plan to attend. Often colleges and universities publish scholarship supplements to their calendars.

THE HOW TO'S OF SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

Definition: An “entrance scholarship” is one that is available only to students who are proceeding from Grade 12 **directly** to study at a post-secondary institution.

Scholarship candidates should follow certain guidelines:

1. Survey the range of scholarships available.
2. Determine which scholarships are realistically available by consulting the criteria and application deadlines pertinent to each scholarship.
3. Make note of those scholarships for which writing of B.C. Government Scholarship Examinations is a prerequisite.
4. Maintain a high grade point average. In some cases, candidates are screened according to their GPA. For some scholarships, the relevant GPA may be based on grades achieved in a specialty area over a two-year period.
5. Check parental affiliation with unions, private institutions, companies and organizations for scholarship opportunities available to dependents.

Strategies:

1. Begin the application procedure as early as possible. The process of acquiring the application forms, gathering letters of reference, etc. can take a considerable length of time.
2. Chart the scholarships for which you will be applying. Set deadlines for yourself. For example, when you have all the letters of reference, work back from the application deadline.
3. Apply for as many scholarships as you realistically feel you may qualify.
4. Apply for a Social Insurance Number. Recipients of scholarships are required to have one.
5. Prepare a letter of application early in the application process. Read this letter several times throughout the process. You will probably find that changes will be made.
6. Keep all your scholarship information in a safe place and save this information on your computer because you may be able to re-use it for other applications. It's easier to edit what you already have than to recreate it again.
7. Prepare an essay that speaks about your specialties, activities, philosophy, aspirations and commitment. Remember to capture the interest of the scholarship panel of judges. Among the many applications, you must show that you are special. They must hear your “voice”!

IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS

TRANSCRIPTS

When applying for either a scholarship or to a post secondary institution, a transcript of grades is required to process your application. **Transcript Request forms** are available in the counselling centre on Mrs. Hopton's door or in the Main Office. Completed forms can be given directly to Mrs. Stare in the office for processing.

PLAN AHEAD! Please allow at least five school days for transcripts to be prepared. Official transcripts, along with an open copy, can be picked up at the office.

If you are applying to a college or university in BC, you may **not** need a transcript. Some institutions require you to self report your grades and final grades are verified after you've given the Ministry of Education permission, via the online Post Secondary Institution (**PSI**) Selections Form, to release your transcript information.

Students' PSI selections must be submitted by **April 30** for **interim** transcript information to be forwarded to BC and Ontario Universities Application Centre (OUAC) institutions in May. For final transcript information to be sent to PSIs by July 31, 2011, students must submit their PSI selections by **June 30**. In addition to the BC Electronic PSIs option and the Ontario University Application Centre (**OUAC**) Electronic PSIs option in Section 1 of the form, students may submit a **maximum of six selections** to other specialized training/educational centres.

Follow the steps below:

- Step 1:** Students log into their account through the *Student Secure Web* and select the link **“Post Secondary Institute Selections”**
- Step 2:** Students should carefully read through the *“Important Notes”* before selecting the **“Select PSIs”** link.
- Step 3:** Section 1 allows students to select all of the BC Electronic PSIs and/or the Ontario University Application Centre. In addition, they may make a total of 6 more selections from Sections 2 and 3.
Once all choices have been selected students hit the **“Next”** button to proceed to the authorization page.
- Step 4:** Students must confirm and authorize the ministry to forward their information as requested.
- Step 5:** Students should print off this page as a confirmation of their selections.
Alternatively this page can also be viewed again at a later date by selecting the **“View PSI Selections”** link on the introduction page (Step 2).

REFERENCE LETTERS

Reference letters are vital when applying for a job, a post secondary program and a scholarship. Before approaching someone to write a reference for you, prepare your Student Profile (Pg. 13) to provide the writer with some additional information about yourself.

Remember to plan ahead and give the writer a lot of time. One to two weeks notice is a sign of courtesy. Follow up with simple reminder of your reference request a couple days before you pick it up. Keep a copy of your reference letter in your resume file too!
