Re: <u>Communicating Student Learning</u>

Our District's mission is to inspire all learners to reach their full potential and create a lasting legacy for the future. We acknowledge that all students have different strengths and our role as educators is to foster learning. Our District continues to value student assessment as a necessary part of the learning process. Educators have always provided parents/guardians, the answer to "How is my child doing in school?" Our District will continue to do this, but we want to inform you about the continuing shift in how we communicate student learning (report cards) which we believe will benefit all students in Langley.

This new method of communicating student learning focuses on the idea that learning is a journey that has no end. It requires educators and families to have a deeper, multi-dimensional, and holistic view of their child, rather than a simple check mark or letter grade. It involves more care, communication, and collaboration among teachers, students, and their families.

We recognize that this change may cause some concern or raise questions for some. Our commitment to students and families is to provide as much information as possible and be able to respond to your concerns. Our teachers and administrators have been trained on this new assessment process. We are confident in our staff and their ability to guide you through these changes and continue to enhance your child's learning journey in our school system and beyond.

The following information bulletin has been compiled by our leaders in our Instructional Services department. Their role is to develop our District's overarching education strategy including assessment. Our staff are excited to roll out this new way of communicating student learning beginning in this school year.

Where were we prior to September 2021

In the 2021 school year, elementary and middle schools transitioned to using the Ministry Proficiency Scale to communicate student learning. Secondary schools continued to utilize letter grades at grades 8 and 9.

Where we are now?

Our secondary schools are beginning the shift away from assigning letter grades on report cards at the grades 8 and 9 level over this year and next school year. Instead, teachers will use the Ministry's Proficiency Scale (below) as a component of communicating student learning with families. We strongly encourage families to read the Langley School District Communicating Student Learning information here. This shift also aligns with the Draft Ministry Reporting Order which will come into effect September 2022.

- ✓ Empower students to take ownership of their learning
- ✓ Foster hope, efficacy (belief in themselves) and a culture of learning



Why the shift in communicating student learning?



This change in reporting practice can be seen across the province, as school districts work to better align themselves with the Ministry of Education's reporting policy and with BC's redesigned curriculum.

Research is clear that traditional letter grades signal the end of learning by suggesting that a particular subject is mastered or completed, but learning is actually a continuous process. The use of the Ministry Proficiency Scale will allow teachers to share where a student is currently at in their learning, as well as where they are going next. This

model fosters a growth mindset for students, the empowering confidence that our abilities will continue to develop with hard work, effort and determination.

The Ministry Proficiency Scale, as seen above, describes student learning based on widely held expectations for the grade level and time of year. Proficiency levels, and the language of 'Emerging', 'Developing', 'Proficient', and 'Extending', will be used to describe student progress in all subject areas within a model of communicating student strengths, areas for growth, and ways to support learning at home and at school.

What can parents/quardians do to prepare for this shift?

We know families have always been involved in their child's education. We want to build on that success and invite parents to continue to engage with teachers and staff moving forward.

As a start, we encourage parents to take part in a Family Information Session which will be hosted virtually on October 14th at 7:00 pm. The Family Information Session will be hosted by the District's Director of Instruction, Dawne Tomlinson, and District Principal of Instructional Services, George Kozlovic.
